FROM THE FIELD- OUR TRAPPER JENNA FISHER



I have been out and about in the rain, wind, snow, and the occasional sunshine in the last few months.

Even though the catch numbers decline rapidly in winter it is still important we get out there to check, clear and rebait traps so no matter the weather I try and get out provided it is safe to do so. In the past two months I have cleared a lot of rats from traps and the hedgehogs are starting to emerge now. There is something exciting about finding a stoat in a trap in the depths of winter, even better when that stoat is a female, as has happened a few times this winter, it certainly helps keep the enthusiasm alive when it is freezing cold and wet.

The coming months will be spent ensuring the traps we have on the ground are checked as regularly as possible, ideally every 30 days. I am currently using Eraze, a dehydrated rabbit bait and eggs kindly donated by the Egg Project.

I also use pork fat to keep the pests interested and this is particularly useful in the SA2 Cat traps.The roadside and farmland traps are doing a great job of reducing the feral cat numbers in the Pohangina and Apiti areas.

The rats are dominating our trap catches now, but it won't be long until the juvenile stoats and weasels start emerging from the nests and causing havoc. Last Spring and Summer we had a huge increase in mustelid catches so we know we must be on the ground doing the hard work now to ensure when these juvenile's emerge we are ready to lure them into the traps and stop the cycle of damage to our native birds from these vicious predators.
