

Future Living Skills workshop take home points

Resilience and Disaster Preparedness is a big and important topic. Here are just a few key messages:

- □ Make sure you have enough water stored to get through at least 3 days. Add five drops of non-scented liquid household chlorine bleach per litre to the water. You can find instructions for storing drinking water here (see instructions under Prepare Containers of Water.)

  You will find lots of other useful information on the government's Get Ready website
- Make a plan! Start with the worksheets from the session and keep going - you can make your plan in bits over time. The Get Ready website can help with that too.
- □ Be aware that gas leaks are an explosion risk after a severe earthquake! If you have gas at your house know where to turn it off (usually a yellow toby at the street or front of your house). If you are in an urban area and your neighbours might have gas, don't light a fire or even candles until the "all clear" is given. Use battery powered lighting instead. Keep a torch by your bed.
- Get to know your neighbours who nearby may need extra support, and who can offer help (knowledge, resources etc)? Consider joining Neighbourhood Support or even starting your own group!

# PNCC/ENM SECTOR SESSION – WASTE BYLAW + RESERVE MANAGEMENT PLANS

#### Waste Bylaw

PNCC is consulting on some proposed changes to the Waste Management and Minimisation Bylaw. This follows on from the review of the Waste Management and Minimisation Plan earlier this year.

They have organised a session for the membership of Environment Network Manawatū to present the proposed changes, answer any questions you might have, and provide an opportunity for discussion. They will have some

copies of the draft Bylaw for you to take away, and iPads in case you want to make a submission online. Submissions will be open until 24 January 2025.

The Justice select committee is now calling for public submissions on the Principles of the Treaty of Waitangi Bill.


Submissions are open until 11.59pm Tuesday, January 7 2025

National's James Meager chairs the committee and told Te Ao Māori News it would be working to a typical six-month timeframe for the overall process - though hearings were intended to be wrapped up by the end of February.

## HARD TO RECYCLE



Recycle E wast for FREE at Noel Leeming

In New Zealand, e-waste is increasing at a rate three times faster than municipal waste streams, with the average Kiwi generating more than 21kg of unwanted and end-of-life e-products each year. We hope this programme will help New Zealand divert a significant amount of e-waste from landfills, and recover precious resources to be recycled.

#### Drop off

- Personal and laptop computers and all cables
- Tablets, notebooks and palmtops.
- Computer monitors and parts (e.g. internal hard drives and CD drives)
- Computer peripherals and accessories (e.g. mice, keyboards, web cameras, USBs and modems)
- Printers, scanners, and multi-function devices
- Photographic cameras and video cameras

#### What happends to it?

All e-waste recovered through TechCollect NZ pilot programme is recycled by local recyclers who recover and recirculate as much material as possible. However, where our local recycling partners are unable to treat certain e- waste components due to recycling capability limitations e.g., printed circuit boards, or where there are limited end markets for recovered resources e.g., plastics, they are exported under permit for environmentally sound treatment or further processing offshore.

Metals: All processed in New Zealand

Non-leaded glass: Processed in New Zealand

Printer and computer plastic: Sorted into polymer type, granulated and then exported to Malaysia (HIPS from cartridges and printers may be processed in China)

PCBs: Exported to Japan for processing

Lithium batteries: Exported to South Korea for processing

CRT and flat screen monitors: First stage recycling performed by Abilities group in Auckland. Plastic is exported to Malaysia for processing and leaded glass is exported to Nyrstar in Australia for processing. Metals, clean glass and mercury tubes are processed in New Zealand.
